In Canada, the government in the province Things to talk about at home ... of Ontario is set to pass a new law that will make it compulsory for children aged 12 and under to wear lifejackets on boats. Parents, guardians, or other adults supervising children could be subject to a fine of up to \$200 (£130) if they do not comply. In the UK, currently, there is no legal requirement for anyone using rivers and seas for leisure purposes to wear a lifejacket/personal flotation device (PFD).

Eco-Schools Green Flag Award



This year our focus is on working towards the Green Flag Award as part of Eco Schools. Here is some information:

Eco-Schools is a charitable organisation that encourages students to protect their school and the wider environment through accomplishing eco-challenges along a journey towards the award of their ultimate accolade, a Green Flag Award. Involvement of every member of the school community is essential to raise awareness of environmental issues through planning and running the eco-projects in school and currently, over 19.5 million students around the world are engaged with Eco-Schools.

It is the world's largest schools' environmental programme and pupils taking part can learn about everything from litter and biodiversity to energy and global citizenship.

The programme is open to all schools from nurseries to sixth forms. For schools to reach the internationally recognised Green Flag standard, they must follow a seven-step framework that requires them to cover environmental topics in the classroom and make their school grounds more sustainable. Seven Steps Overview:

- 1. Eco Committee An Eco-Committee is a group of young people who, with the support of one or more adult Eco-Coordinators, lead the Eco-Schools programme in the school. The Eco-Committee will meet regularly throughout the academic year, plan and deliver environmental projects, and inspire their schoolmates and wider school community.
- 2. Environmental Review -A set of fact-finding questions linked to the Eco-Schools topics that have been designed to help the Eco Committee understand the environmental work the school is already doing, whilst inspiring further student-led actions.
- 3. Action Plan the Eco Committee plans and delivers plans and projects for up to 3 of the Eco topics to work on during the academic year.
- 4. Curriculum Links including environmental education linked to the topics in the learning throughout the year.
- 5. Informing and Involving engaging the whole school and its community in eco projects and action.
- 6. Monitoring and Evaluation assessing the impact of the projects, providing a platform to build
- 7. Eco Code a whole-school promise to protect the planet, reflecting the work the Eco Committee has completed in the Action Plan during the school year.

What we will be doing at Middle Barton School:

- Mrs Horner is our Eco Co-ordinator and will be recording all the information on our Eco projects as evidence to apply for the Green Flag
- forming an Eco Committee 2 representatives from each year group
- Updates in the Newsletter with a weekly focus
- carry out energy monitoring within school
- making a commitment to help the planet
- taking part in at least three eco projects each year
